

Use/Possession of Drugs, Alcohol	Student is in possession of, caught using, or under the influence of illegal drugs or alcohol.  • Alcohol • Marijuana • Dab Pens
Possession of a Dangerous Weapon	Student is in possession of knives or guns (real or look alike), or other objects readily capable of causing bodily harm, or creating the impression (as in the case of a fake gun or grenade) of causing bodily harm.
Physical/Verbal Assault on School Personnel	Intentional aggressive physical OR verbal actions (e.g., hitting, kicking, throwing objects at, pushing, extreme inappropriate language, aggressive postures, etc) directed at school staff/personnel.
Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying	Student delivers disrespectful messages (electronically, verbally, or gesturally) to another person that includes threats, intimidation, obscene gestures, pictures, or written notes. Disrespectful messages include negative comments based on race, ethnicity, disability, religion, gender, age, national origin, and or sexual orientation.
